BASIS OF JURISDICTIONAL DETERMINATION:

A. Waters defined under 33 CFR part 329 as "navigable waters of the United States":

- The presence of waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce.

B. Waters defined under 33 CFR part 328.3(a) as "waters of the United States":

- (1) The presence of waters, which are currently used, or were used in the past, or may be susceptible to use in interstate or foreign commerce, including all waters which are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide.
- (2) The presence of interstate waters including interstate wetlands¹.

Rationale for the Basis of Jurisdictional Determination (applies to any boxes checked above).

Threemile Creek is jurisdictional as a tributary to an interstate water (Category 5). It flows into Fivemile Creek, which flows into Tenmile Creek, which flows into Fifteenmile Creek, which flows into the Boise River, which flows into Snake River, which is an interstate water (Category 2). A total of 0.05 acres of emergent wetlands, as wetlands adjacent to an interstate water (Category 7). They border and are contiguous to Threemile Creek, which are tributaries to an interstate water (Category 5).

A recent decision by the US Supreme Court in the *Rapanos/Carabell* cases has brought into question the Corps' regulatory jurisdiction over certain water of the United States regulated under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. At this time, we are awaiting guidance from our Headquarters regarding our jurisdiction and hope to have that guidance within the next few weeks. The guidance may change our jurisdictional determination. If you believe our jurisdictional determination is inappropriate in light of the *Rapanos/Carabell* court decision, you may ask the Corps to re-evaluate it once we receive further guidance from our Headquarters.
