Lieutenant Colonel David A. Caldwell assumed command of the Walla Walla District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on July 9, 2010.

Lieutenant Colonel Caldwell most recently served as the Future Operations Chief for the U.S. Army Asymmetric Warfare Group at Fort Meade, Maryland. Other prior assignments include: Battalion Executive Officer, 1st Cavalry Division Special Troops Battalion including a deployment to Baghdad, Iraq; Battle Command Training Program Observer/Trainer; Observer/Controller at the National Training Center; Commander, B Company, 16th Engineer Battalion including KFOR-2A; V Corps

Topographic and Construction Officer; Assistant Brigade Engineer for the 1st Brigade, 1st Infantry Division; and Adjutant, Company Executive Officer, Line Platoon Leader, and Assault and Obstacle Platoon Leader in the 1st Engineer Battalion.

He was commissioned into the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in 1992 upon graduating from Wheaton College, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in geology. He also earned a master of science degree in management (with a project management emphasis) from Thomas Edison State College.

Lieutenant Colonel Caldwell is a graduate of the Engineer Officer's Basic and Advanced Courses; the Mapping, Charting, and Geodesy Officer Course; the Combined Arms Services Staff School; and the Command and General Staff College. He is also Ranger, Airborne, and Air Assault qualified.
