Project Description

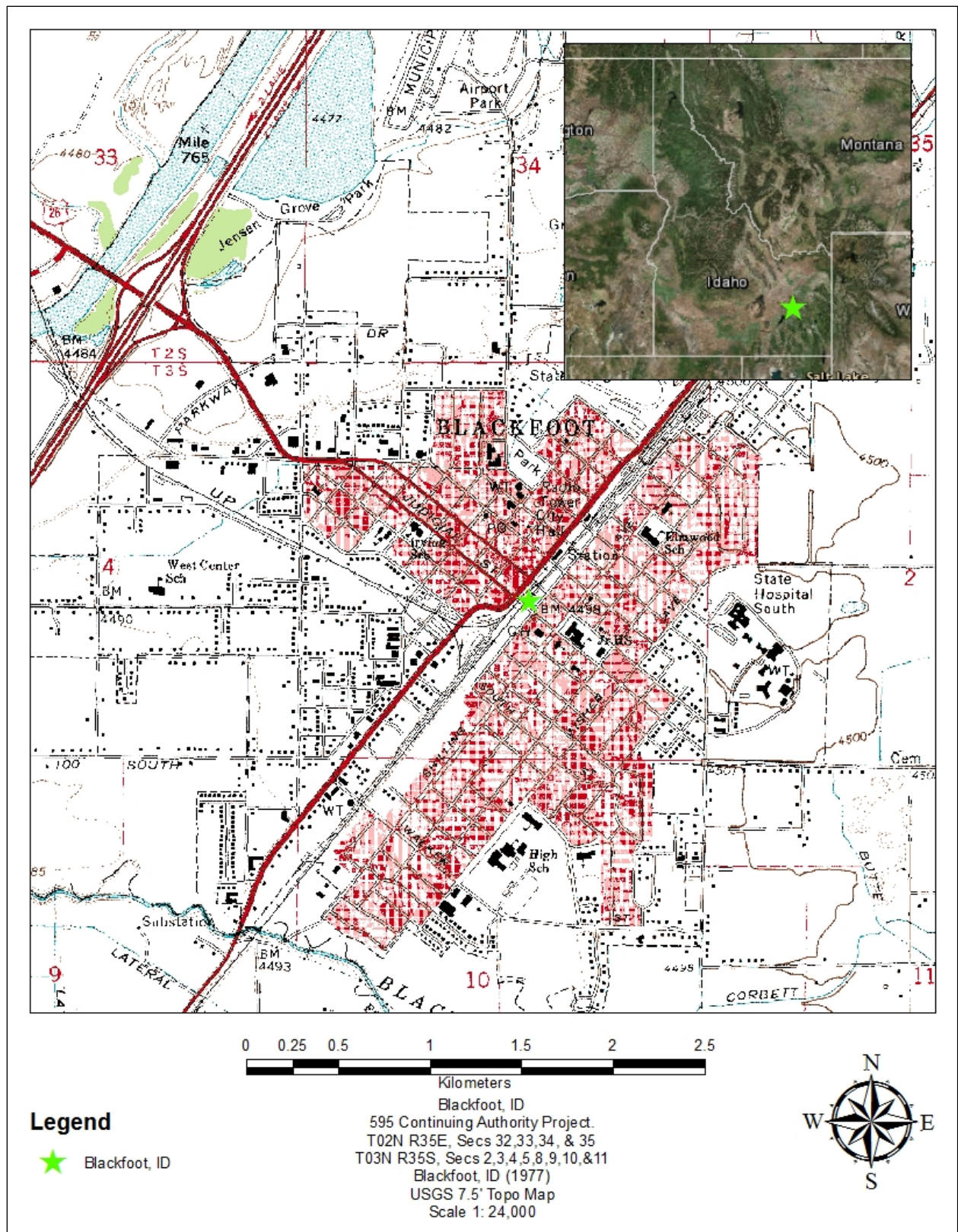


Figure 1: Location map for the Blackfoot, ID Wastewater Improvement Project.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, (Corps) Walla Walla District proposes to participate in a cost share project with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the City of Blackfoot, Idaho (Figure 1) in order to rehabilitate the city's wastewater collection and treatment systems. The rehabilitation process will include two phases. The first phase will include construction of a new mixed liquor suspended solids (MLSS) distribution box and secondary clarifier #3, changes to the RAS/WAS control box, replacement of the existing intermediate pump station, and rehabilitation of the secondary digester cover. Phase 1 has been completed using non-Federal funds and Phase 2, which will use federal funding, includes the designs for Riverton sewer upgrades, Riverton water upgrades, Headworks upgrades, aeration upgrades, ultraviolet disinfection upgrades, hydraulic bottleneck between secondary clarifiers and UV disinfections system, thermophilic digester cover repair, headworks odor control system, and waste soils thickening and thermophilic digester upgrades. Phase 2 efforts are limited to design reviews which typically would have the NHPA determination of no potential to effect historic properties. However, because these designs are intended to be constructed, the Corps has considered these associated effects as well.

Determination of Effect

Idaho Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) consulted with the Idaho State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), Shoshone Bannock Tribes, and the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes. Neither tribe responded to the consultation efforts initiated by DEQ. The Idaho SHPO did not identify any historic properties within the total project's area of potential effect (APE). Furthermore, Idaho SHPO determined there are no historic properties within the APE and concluded that the overall project is located within previously disturbed soils (Appendix A).

Because the Corps undertaking was included in this consultation effort, the Corps concurs with this determination of no historic properties affected. Furthermore, the Corps determined that additional tribal consultation was not necessary because the project is located within the Blackfoot Wastewater Treatment facility.
